First Lutheran Ministry Support Update

This is an update from the Treasurer on the support of the ministries of the Church so people know where we currently stand.

As you review this information please be aware that:

• Ministry Support has totaled as follows: 2016 -\$144,576, 2017 - \$146,667, 2018 - \$131,563, through 9 months in 2019 we are at \$105,009.18. It should be noted some members have already paid their full pledge using IRA distributions.

• Ministry Support ended 2018 with a positive balance of \$3,001.28.

• Pastor Holmes is working a 75% schedule and his insurance expenses are very reasonable.

• 2016 was the last year we had a budget with a full time pastor, total expenses were \$157,255. Our projected 2019 total for Ministry Support is \$139,424. We are pursuing a full-time Pastor; however our compensation package would be at the low end, so a new graduate is what we would likely be looking for.

• We are currently paying monthly Benevolence to the Synod in the amount of \$1,000 per month.

Current Financial Condition as of 9/30/2019

• Through the month of September ministry costs have been \$98,487.90, while ministry support stands at 105,009.18, leaving a positive balance of \$6,521.68.

 Projected ministry support for the first 9 months was \$102,258.00, and projected expenses were \$106,752.19.

• There are no loans outstanding at this time.

Year-End Projections for 12/31/2019

 Projections through the end of the year, assuming that Ministry Support remains relatively stable are as follows: Ministry Costs for the year \$132,411, Ministry Support for the year \$141,437, leaving positive balance of \$9,025. Projections for 2020

• The budget for 2020 does not include calling a new pastor. If we do call one the budget will be adjusted at that time.

• Benevolence payments to the Synod will be increased by 5%, from \$1,000 per month, to \$1,050.

• The estimate of all Ministry Costs would be approximately \$145,000.

• Based upon a projected Ministry Support total of \$141,437 for this year, our responses to God's blessings would need to grow by \$3,563. This represents an increase of 2.5% in overall support.

We need to pray for God to lead us and help us find what we are meant to do. We live in a bountiful world with so many things to be thankful for. Please pray for the ministry of First Lutheran as we prepare for 2020.




In November our choices in mission project is God's Barnyard.

A Growing Family

Lindsey and Andrea were no strangers to foster parenting. Their older brother fostered children for 10 years, and they were inspired by his drive and passion for supporting vulnerable children. Until recently, they hadn't seen themselves as foster parents. But something in their hearts told them they were needed.

"It's been on our hearts for a lot of years, and we have the room and love," Andrea says. "It's something we knew we could do and it's needed." The two sisters decided

to become licensed foster parents earlier this year through LSI Foster Care and Adoption. Now, they are caring for children in foster care at the same time. Lindsey and Andrea regularly meet up to support one another and ensure the children can connect and feel less alone during the most vulnerable time in their young lives. "It's been so important to have a connection to another foster family," Lindsey says. "The kids can see they're not different. There are other children in their same situation."

Meanwhile, they are busy building a strong bond with the children's birth families. Lindsey says foster

parenting is a way for them to give a child stability while also nurturing their whole family.

Lindsey and Andrea have also found support from other local foster families. They are there for each other, offering a shoulder to lean on when anyone needs an extra boost on the difficult days.

"There is a need for foster families in Iowa, and there is so much good that comes out of fostering," Andrea says.


