Make this cute puppet to show and tell the amazing story of metamorphosis.

Scissors

Markers

• Glue

· Googly eyes

Coffee filter

- What you need:
- Needle and string
- 12 small pom-poms
- Wooden craft stick
- What you do:

- Sew pom-poms together to make a caterpillar body. Tie off that string.
- 2. Thread another string up through the first pompom, leaving 12 inches to dangle. Repeat with the ninth pom-pom, leaving two dangling strings.
- Wrap those strings around opposite ends of the stick, adjusting their length to about 6 inches. Tie in place.
- Glue on eyes.
- Flatten the coffee filter and draw a symmetrical design on it. Pleat in the center to create wings.
- Move the caterpillar puppet by holding the stick. Glue on the wings as you describe the transformation into a butterfly.

While we are hunkering down in Newton, the Coronavirus is also, sadly, making inroads in Tanzania. Because flights in and out of Tanzania were canceled before Paula and Denny's return, they are still in social isolation in Overland Park. and teams that were scheduled to visit the Children's Hospital at Zinga this summer will not be able to go.

But Dr. Charles Powell, who visited our church with Dr. Denny and Paula Lofstrom in October, is in Zinga now. He arrived in February with three engineers who had volunteered their services to plan the hospital's wastewater treatment, necessary because of the high water table. The engineers returned to the States before the travel ban, but Charles stayed. As he says in the April newsletter, "For all practical purposes, I am 'stuck' in Zinga, but I can't think of anywhere I'd rather be 'stuck'."

Thanks to donations to the hospital, everyone there has protective equipment which keeps them safe and prevents spreading the virus. Patients are being seen and provided education on how to stay safe in the pandemic.

Some baptism and confirmation liturgies pray for God to "stir up in" the newly baptized or confirmed "the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in [God's] presence."

Raising Healthy Families

As a child, Morgan had endured trauma no one should experience. Addiction, divorce, and difficult family relationships all surrounded Morgan in her childhood home. When she found out she was pregnant for the first time with her daughter, Sophia, Morgan was determined to never repeat the past she grew up with.

She decided to enroll in LSI's Early Childhood Services.

Every week, her LSI worker, Ashley, would bring ageappropriate toys and games for Sophia to play with. She provided Morgan with educational resources to help her track Sophia's development and make sure her daughter was hitting all her important milestones. When Morgan welcomed her second child, Nolan, Ashley was with her every step of the way. It was Ashley who noticed that Nolan had developed a speech delay, and she helped Morgan connect with a speech therapist to correct it early.

Sophia is now in preschool and loves telling her mom about her teachers, friends, and the new songs she learned at school. Nolan is an active two-year-old who is learning new words every day. Morgan is currently finishing her Registered Nursing degree, and she dreams of working in emergency care at a hospital after graduation. And all the while, Ashley has been there to cheer them on.

"She's been more than a worker, she's been a friend when I've needed someone the most," Morgan says. "Being a new mom is hard. Having that extra person there, who doesn't judge you, who doesn't see your flaws, who is just there to help you – you can't put a price on that."


