Future of Community Meals

Our church has been serving the free community meal at 1st United Methodist Church for many years. We cover the 4th Wednesday of each month in September - May. We thank Marlys Amundsen, Judy Swenson, and Candy Thompson for coordinating this outreach project for many years. Now it's time for the rest of us to step up! The council is committed to continue this service.

There are always folks willing to provide food to keep the costs down, and come help on the nights we serve. We need folks who will agree to plan each month. That involves creating the menu, putting out a list of needed groceries/food (or purchasing at Fareway and having the bill put on the 1st Lutheran account) and knowing how to set it up at the Methodist church.

The council believes the task could fall to 9 different people/families/groups. Team up with your favorite member, and let us know what month you want to do. Marlys provided wonderful recipes and how many they serve. Those are in the tub of supplies in the church kitchen, so it's easy to plan a meal (or you can come up with your own). We need to have a menu plan for each month by mid August to take to a planning meeting with all the churches involved (to make sure we don't serve chili four weeks in a row in January?). Some of us who have done this meal will assist you in understanding how it is served (it will be going back to in house dining in September) and how to find items and use the 1st Methodist kitchen. Sometimes prep has also been done in our church kitchen and carted over if that is better for you.

Our church should also have one contact person for the coordinator, Mel Wilson at 1st Methodist, to call. That person would simply know who is doing each month and what they plan to serve in case there are questions.

In God's hands

In Keep a Quiet Heart, Christian missionary Elisabeth Elliot ponders the faith implications of fretting about days to come. "Today is mine; tomorrow is none of my business," she writes. "If I peer anxiously into the fog of the future, I will strain my spiritual eyes so that I will not see clearly what is required of me now."

And what's the alternative? Instead of dwelling on times to come, which we can't change anyway, Elliot recommends: "Leave it all in the hands that were wounded for you."

Zinga News!

Back in 2017, Paula and Denny Lofstrom, our Tanzania medical missionaries, shared the story of little Jafari, 3-1/2 years old. Jafari suffers from athetoid quadriplegia, a chronic condition caused by hyperbilirubinemia, too much bilirubin in the blood. The seizures caused by the excess of bilirubin resulted in brain damage. While symptoms vary, in Jafari's case it means that though he is of normal intelligence, he is non-verbal, and involuntary muscle movements mean he is unable to stand and walk unassisted.

When he first came to the Children's Hospital, he was given his own walker, a gift from Canadian donors. Imagine being a toddler with his disabilities, then suddenly being able to walk! But that was not all: Pediatric physical therapist Dawn Wakefield and special education teacher Mary Pace designed assistive devices that enabled Jafari to hold a spoon or a crayon. Now he could feed himself, and even have fun drawing. And being able to hold a crayon or pencil meant that this non-verbal child would someday be able to communicate in writing.

In the May Zinga Update, Dr. Jesse Kitundu included a photo of Jafari, who continues to come to the Children's Hospital for treatment. He no longer has convulsions. The hospital is arranging for him to get a national health insurance card. And Mary Pace, from her home in Missouri, continues to work with Jafari and coach his parents via WhatsApp. She looks forward to being able to work with them in person when travel to Tanzania is safe again.

The flavor of the gospel

"You are the salt of the earth. But what good is salt if it has lost its flavor?" (Matthew 5:13, NLT). These words from Jesus might seem strange to us — can salt lose its flavor? But in New Testament times, most of the salt used as seasoning, preservative, medicinal aid and more came from the Dead Sea, where impurities often compromised its usefulness, especially its flavor.

Jesus urges his disciples — including us — to not let the flavor of the gospel be suppressed in our lives. What might do this? Teachings that treat patriotism, prosperity or any other value as equal to Jesus; the tendency to elevate one nation, church denomination, theological understanding or religious tradition above all others; such intense focus on the laws of ancient Israel that we neglect the superseding grace of God. But neither should we force the gospel on people, like overpowering their food by dumping in too much salt at once.


As followers of Jesus, we're the salt of the earth. Let us use his good news to gently season others' lives with service and love.

Saved from sinking

For Michael Phelps, the most decorated Olympian of all time, fame and gold medals weren't enough to shore up a drowning self-esteem. The U.S. swimmer, who faced legal trouble and ended up in rehab, contemplated suicide during the prime of his sports career. "I thought the world would just be better off without me," Phelps told ESPN.

Then a friend, NFL star Ray Lewis, sent Phelps a copy of Rick Warren's bestseller The Purpose Driven Life. The book made such an impact on Phelps that he read excerpts aloud to fellow rehab-clinic patients, who dubbed him Preacher Mike. "It's turned me into believing there is a power greater than myself, and there is a purpose for me on this planet," Phelps says. "It helped me when I was in a place where I needed the most help." The swimmer's message to Lewis? By extending a hand and sharing the gospel's message of hope, "You saved my life."

use and trauma continued for
more than 20 years but when
she learned she was pregnant with her son, Apollo,
she knew she needed a
change. After giving birth,
Hali entered treatment and
when she was ready to return home, LSI Early Childhood Services were there to
provide support and walk
alongside her.

Her LSI worker, Gretchen, provided parenting education and resources, all while empowering Hali and making sure Apollo had a healthy home. Gretchen helped Hali

keep track of Apollo's growth to ensure he hit all his important developmental milestones.

More than a year later, Hali is thriving. She is now in college and is also a sponsor to other women who are on the same path to recovery. At home, Hali is busy keeping up with Apollo as he is learning to walk, and she is excited to see him continue to grow.

"Gretchen has given me a lot of hope. She's always had my back," Hali says. "She's my go-to person for any resource and it's nice to have her in my corner."



Church Council Meeting Review:

The church council met on June 17 at 6:30 p.m. in the fellowship hall. Jim conducted devotions and called the meeting to order. The May minutes were read and approved. Corinne presented a written treasurer's report and discussed highlights for the group.

In new business, Jane moved and Kay seconded that changes to worship begin in July. These include: masks will now be optional, but social distancing continues; hymnals can now be used, and fellowship will resume. Kay will put together a team to do the fellowship on July 4. The council on duty schedule was reviewed and adjusted. Kay is suggesting that we hold off another year on the corn boil due to the packed crowd we generally get on that night.

CUCC and 1st Presbyterian are ready to notify their congregations of the discussions our task force has been conducting. A letter created by 1st Presbyterian was reviewed,

but it was decided it did not reflect our church status. Pastor Mark will prepare a letter for our congregation and the council will review/ edit it this weekend, hopefully ready to be sent soon. In old business Jim reported that Judy Monroe, Allison Bartholmey and Pastor Mark all attended the Synod meeting on May 21. Jim reviewed the list of members that receive the church services by mail. It is now less than 12. Jim will also chat with Duane Quanbeck about possibly finding a device that might do a better job of recording the services.

There is still a need for folks to attend the front and west landscaping beds starting in July. August has been spoken for.

The council is committed to continue the 4th Wednesday community meal at the Methodist church in the fall. Jane will prepare a plan to present to the congregation in an effort to recruit help, and con-

tact the Methodist church for further information.

Pastor reported that he had conducted a brief funeral service and would be doing a graveside service for another soon. The Bishop is reporting that fill-in ministers are getting very hard to find.

The Faith Formations committee reported that VBS is being held this week in collaboration with United Presbyterian with about 24 children attending. The property committee report was included, showing that the roof is being installed and the two flat roofs that sustained damage are being negotiated with the insurance compa-

The July meeting will be moved to the 22nd with Kay providing devotions.

Meeting adjourned.
