Our church has been serving the free community meal at 1st United Methodist Church for many years. We cover the 4th Wednesday of each month in September - May. We thank Marlys Amundsen, Judy Swenson, and Candy Thompson for coordinating this outreach project for many years. Now it's time for the rest of us to step up! The council is committed to continue this service.

There are always folks willing to provide food to keep the costs down, and come help on the nights we serve. We need folks who will agree to plan each month. That involves creating the menu, putting out a list of needed groceries/food (or purchasing at Fareway and having the bill put on the 1st Lutheran account) and knowing how to set it up at the Methodist church.

The council believes the task could fall to 9 different people/families/groups. Team up with your favorite member, and let us know what month you want to do. Marlys provided wonderful recipes and how many they serve. Those are in the tub of supplies in the church kitchen, so it's easy to plan a meal (or you can come up with your own). We need to have a menu plan for each month by mid August to take to a planning meeting with all the churches involved (to make sure we don't serve chili four weeks in a row in January?). Some of us who have done this meal will assist you in understanding how it is served (it will be going back to in house dining in September) and how to find items and use the 1st Methodist kitchen. Sometimes prep has also been done in our church kitchen and carted over if that is better for you.. Zinga News!

In any normal year, Zinga would now be abuzz with visiting teams and medical students, but as we know, even though things are loosening up a bit in the US, this is not much like a normal year. In Tanzania, that is even more true than here. While we in lowa have ready access to free Covid vaccines, in Tanzania, only 1 percent of the population has been vaccinated. It did not help that former president Magufuli was a Covid denier, but fortunately, the current president Samia Hassan is doing her best to get people vaccinated. The problem now, as in most of Africa, is access to vaccine. Meanwhile, we await the day when it will be safe to return to Zinga. Teams are signed up for next year; let us pray they will be able to go.

In the meantime, work goes on at Zinga. The hospital is providing free cervical cancer screenings. The government chose the hospital at Zinga for this ongoing project because of its excellent

laboratory and trained staff.

You may recall that some months ago, a grass fire started by neighbors got out of control and burned onto the hospital grounds. One of the cement block roundhouses where volunteers stay was destroyed in the fire. Fortunately, this was last year, so the house was empty. Sele and his team are using the rubble from the broken blocks to improve the roads before the rainy season and will be rebuilding the



house with new cement blocks made onsite. Recycling is alive and well at Zinga!

Meanwhile, back in Overland Park, both Paula and Denny Lofstrom are eager to return to Zinga. Let us pray that it will soon be safe for all to visit there.

"The most basic and powerful way to connect to another person is to listen," says Dr. Rachel Naomi Remen, author and integrative medicine professor. "Perhaps the most important thing we ever give each other is our attention."

Twice in Mark 4, while teaching, Jesus urges, "Let anyone with ears to hear listen" (verses 9 & 23, NRSV). One way we show what Jesus means to us is by truly listening to his word — not just hearing sounds but being attentive and intentional. Likewise, one way we love and serve others is by respectfully listening to them: not assuming we know what they feel or mean or will say; not planning what to say even as they're still speaking, but listening deeply to learn about them and their experience.

We often think living our faith calls for great accomplishments or worldwide reach. But Remen says, "A loving silence often has ... power to heal and to connect." Don't underestimate something as

While Stan Purdum pastored an Ohio church in 1988, the region suffered a major drought. Congregants who were farmers saw their fields — and livelihoods — dry up and die. "I was impressed that they didn't stop attending church and kept giving offerings," he says. "A cynic might respond, 'Well, the farmers don't want to offend God and cause him to withhold more rain.' But I concluded, 'Look at their remarkable faith."

During the drought, Purdum gave a sermon about Elijah challenging the prophets of Baal (I Kings 18:20-40). "Like Elijah, we need to hold on to our belief in God's goodness," he preached. "God will again send rain on our land. We will continue to pray for it. Perhaps it's too late for this year's crop, and we need to care for the people affected. But we do so while maintaining our faith in God's providence."

Back to School Month

School is right around the corner! This time of year can be exciting and stressful for many of us, but adjusting back into a classroom routine can be especially difficult for kids and teens with emotional or behavioral disorders. Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) provides mental and behavioral health services for children and families across the state. Our therapists provide virtual and in-person therapy sessions with children, while our Behavioral Health Intervention Services (BHIS) team collaborates with families in their home or in a community setting to help them develop skills like anger management and healthy decision making. LSI also provides 24-hour mental health care at the Bremwood and Beloit Residential Treatment Centers in Waverly and Ames to empower lowa children and teens.

Helping Families Adjust to a New Normal

Uriyah felt overwhelmed by anxiety.

During the pandemic, it was hard for him to even leave his room, talk to his family, and attend school. When classes moved online, he felt comfortable completing his homework and attending classes virtually. But when it was time to return to school for in-person classes, he would not attend. His mom, Holly, wanted him to be able to finish the school year virtually, but she needed help

navigating the transition with his school.

That's when she learned about LSI's STEP IN community program. Through the service. LSI social workers are there to build on a family's strengths and ensure children and parents have what they need to thrive and create a brighter future. Children and teens in the program work with their LSI team to develop coping skills, conflict resolution, and healthy communication. The LSI team helped Uriyah feel more comfortable engaging with his family, and Holly had the support she needed to work with the school, advocate for her child, and ensure Uriyah could finish the school year online. Now. Urivah has felt a weight lifted off his shoulders, and he successfully graduated out of LSI programming. The last year has created unprecedented stress and anxiety for many children and teens, but Uriyah now feels more comfortable and confident moving



forward.

The church council met on July 22, 2021 at 6:30 p.m. in the fellowship hall. Kay conducted devotions and Jim called the meeting to order. The June minutes were read and approved. Council reviewed a letter from Brittany McNeer suggesting that additional partnering with Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Newton should be pursued.

In new business, Report of the Joint Sub-Committee of the Call Committee: Aaron Bartholmey reported on his recent meeting with representatives of United Church of Christ and First Presbyterian. Erica Uthe of the Synod office was in attendance at that meeting. The Lutheran Church has a more formal process than the other denominations for forming partnerships, so the attendees agreed to utilize the Lutheran framework, with no pre-determined goal or outcome in mind. It would start with 30 days of prayer as the first step of a seven step process, with four to six weeks between each step.

Pastor Holmes stated that the Bishop's office is taking a more active role in trying to locate a permanently called pastor for First Lutheran, including contacting any pastors seeking a call and seeing if a partnership with other congregations could be fruitful. The sub-committee is scheduled to meet again in mid-August.

Coyle moved that the Council give its approval to continue with the exploration process with United Church of Christ and First Presbyterian, with Aaron Bartholmey serving as the current representative. Lammey seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Changes to Worship: The Council agreed that no additional changes to the Covid-19 protocols were warranted at this time, especially with the continued spread of variants. Hesse stated that blending in more contemporary worship elements could be good. This would be discussed in more detail in the future.

Landscaping Beds in Front of Church: Property Committee did a huge clean-out job last week. The rest of the summer is sufficiently covered thanks to that large amount of work.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Holmes again reported on the multi-pronged approach the Bishop's office is taking with finding a permanently called pastor for First Lutheran. He stated that he performed three funerals this past month. He continues to preach each week at United Church of Christ and distributes communion there the first Sunday of each month.

Treasurer's Report: Coyle reviewed the financial statements with the Council. She is figuring out the accounting system and will try to help educate the Council about details of the financial aspects of First Lutheran. She provided a true net income figure for the Church by removing the storm damage insurance figures that obscure the

picture. The Church is continuing to have a positive net income for the year to date.


