14 "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. 15 People do not light a lamp and put it under the bushel basket; rather, they put it on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. 16 In the same

way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

My favorite college professor, the one who taught me the power of dialogue to get to mutual understanding, has written a pamphlet for all of us.

"Christianity's PR Problem & What to Do About It" – Mark C. Mattes. It is intended to encourage hope and the practice of faith for the times we are living in

His advice is not that we further adapt to the culture and social norms we live in, rather we seek to deepen our own practice and faith in God's plans for humanity. In this way become better equipped to point out to those drifting: it is God's work in us producing good purposes and blessings. The starting point is to further cultivate our own understanding of how God is at work in all things for good. This is an approach to daily life, all that we have, and can be, with affirmation of God's gracious good will for us and all humanity. With prayers for those who do not entrust their lives to God: ask and trust the Holy Spirit will lead all to embrace God's gifts.

Mattes acknowledges we cannot convince those without faith, to their satisfaction, that God exists and deserves our loyal obedience. Those who limit their measure of truth and reality to human reason and personal experience. Christian apologetics point to what is beyond explanation by reason and experience, the truths of faith communicated to us through Scripture. The promises of God found in God's Word actually do provide a framework, in God's caring for His creation, which satisfactorily accounts for all the observations of reason and experience. But without faith in our beneficent Creator reason and experience alone leave significant gaps those passive toward God ignore or accept in their avoidance of the call of God and power of sin.

The difference believers demonstrate with their lives, compassion, values and priorities reveal a living in relationship with the Creator of all that is, the Son revealed to us in Scripture, through whom we have the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. And the Holy Spirit from within our own selves illuminating the teachings of Scripture and God's presence calling, and equipping, us to love our neighbors as we know ourselves to be loved in God's gracious mercy for sinners.

All of this to make the point that with God central in our lives we stand on a sure foundation, and share in common, a place within the rule and reign of God. We should not expect to fit in with society which during our lifetimes has increasingly worked to edge God out of the public square and human identity. We don't need to oppose nonbelievers, neither be conformed to their coziness with denial; yet for the sake of all hold fast the way, the truth, and the light revealed and secured for us through the life, death, and Easter resurrection of God's own Son, the Messiah of our salvation, Jesus Christ.

This is how Paul describes this paradox in 1 Corinthians 1:18,20-25:

18 For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

20 Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scholar? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? 21 For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of the proclamation, to save those who believe. 22 For Jews ask for signs and Greeks desire wisdom, 23 but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to gentiles, 24 but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. 25 For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Judy reported briefly on the Synod assembly.


Fellowship time was discussed. Council wondered if there are any bakers who would be willing to bake

stable items that can be put aside in the kitchen for a Sunday that no one has signed up for. If either of


these is something you are interested in helping with, please speak with a member of council.

Lead outreach to the community to grow community presence and the congregation.

Assist in finding and developing layperson leaders within our congregation

Instill vitality and variety to create enthusiasm in worship

Develop youth and family educational opportunities.

The congregation will encourage the pastor's ministry in the following ways:

Be available as community resources

The council will guide the pastor through recent and past history of the congregation

A mutual ministry group at First will act as a confidential resource for the pastor.

Fellowship events will be hosted within the congregation and for the general public.

Ongoing emphasis will be placed on open and honest communication, compassion, and

mutual respect.

The letter of call from us, which is provided by the Synod has the following language:

- ...to preach and teach
- ...to administer Baptism and Communion
- ... to lead us in worship
- ... to proclaim the forgiveness of sin
- ...to provide pastoral care
- ...to speak for justice on behalf of the poor and oppressed
- ... to encourage persons to prepare for the ministry
- ... to equip us for witness and service
- ... and guide us in proclaiming God's love through word and deed.

As I read through those statements, I see a lot of action on the part of the congregation.

This is an exciting time in the life of our congregation, and our position in our community. We are indeed called to service as we call a new pastor. Pastor Hoover is our leader and cheerleader as we move forward in our 155th year in Newton.

Let's use this opportunity to remember why the founding members felt it was important to start a Lutheran church in Newton, Iowa. And move forward to assure that First Lutheran is around long after we are all gone.
