It was Lent 3 years ago that I started closing prayers with the line "pray without ceasing". It comes from 1 Thessalonians 5:16-17.

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-17).

And just in the last few months I have noticed that I will be in the middle of doing something and I will realize that I am in the middle of praying in my thoughts. I was sermon writing last week and was trying to think of the first female apostle (her name was Junia and she is mentioned in the letter Paul wrote to the Romans) and I the next thing I new I was a few lines into a prayer for a dear friend who is about to deliver her third child, and first daughter. I may have to suggest Junia as a possible name.

I have been noticing that the prayers my subconscious is thinking keep popping into my conscious thoughts more and more often. When reading Atomic Habits by James Clear when he says "quite literally, you become your habits", it made me think that maybe after all these years I am finally leveling up in my habit of praying without ceasing. Its more than just a nice way to end a prayer that we

are struggling to close. It's an actual habit you can form.

Lent is a time of year when Christians utilize or re-engage dormant faith practices like prayer and fasting almsgiving. Letting go of extra items and practices through fasting frees us up to live and think more in-tune with what God's spirit is actively doing around us. Giving over to God through prayer the things that weigh on our minds and hearts enables us to live into our realities fully. Almsgiving when we share what God first gave us with others who are in need of mercy. I confess I feel victim (as many did) to an unhealthy level of consumerism during the 2020 pandemic. I bought so many books and

sweatpants to cope with all the disappointment of cancellations and being proactive for safety's sake. You become the habits you practice. Practicing safe care for God's people should have always been on our minds. And we unknowingly began to turn our faith practices into some sort of on demand delivery

service. I want to know God right here and now in this way and I expect the results to manifest in this way... or God 2 out of three on his customer service review.

We need both prayer and fasting. Honestly we need almsgiving too! Prayer with our fasting is like boxing with one arm behold your back. Fasting without prayer is just dieting. How often do we try to tackle the bad habits of ours that lead us away from God's purpose for us with just one half of that equation? I confess I talk more about prayer than fasting. And that is a habit I hope to change.

It's not too late to find something to fast from this lent. It's the perfect time to renew your efforts to pray. Just like a boxer uses hands, a sewer uses two bobbins, a student uses both textbooks and real-life experience, you should be emboldened to use all that faith practices at your disposal to aid you in this Lenten journey. 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155 Group Celebration—History Committee Interviews for February

Gloria Grant

First Lutheran prides itself in the sense of community among its' members. As part of the 155 Group Celebration History committee, we would like to focus on building that community by interviewing our legacy members

I had promised a lunch date to Gloria Grant several years ago after choir rehearsal one night. Once Covid hit many things were put on the back burner. We are experiencing a wonderful time in the church when we can freely have fellowship together once again.

As we talked, I learned that James and Gloria were from Adair. I asked how they met, and she said it was a small town and you were bound to bump into each other sooner or later.



The Adair town sign read, "Population 1000. (There are a few good eggs and some bad ones)." Gloria went on to say they started dating when James came home from the Navy. Their first date was to Spike Jones Show. They were married in 1952.

Gloria has always kept a journal and loves to write. From the beginning her ability to tell a story and her academic skills were recognized. In 1947 she enrolled in Simpson College as a Junior High Student to gain her teaching degree. Gloria taught kindergarten in Adair and Newton before settling into her full time Mom roll. Her children encouraged her to publish her writings and her short story "Remembering Jack and Jill" was published in the Our Iowa Magazine. She also has a more current story entitled "Growing Older as a Woman" that she is hoping to get published in a magazine called Reminisce. Either way she has left a cherished memory in her words for her children.

In 1956 Gloria and James moved to Newton. James was taking a job with the ASCS Farm Program and Gloria would continue teaching. When they joined First Lutheran Gloria remembers Dena Jackson as the organist and Lois Egenes was the choir director. She also praised the lovely voice and leadership that Ruth Sharp shared with the choir and church family. Gloria said at that time Newton had a Jasper County Adult Choir that she also sang in.

When asked about church memories Gloria said that there were bats in the upstairs classroom during her Sunday School classes. It was very distracting and difficult to keep the children calm at those times. A childhood memory was from a Christmas program when she was seven years old. Each child had to recite a verse at the program. Hers was John 3:16. She started out just fine and then choked. After a few minutes the program director just ushered her off and went on with the next child.

As always it was a pleasure to visit with Gloria who has matured in faith and prays that we all let God guide us back to what our hearts yearn for here at First Lutheran.

Bob & Judy Floss




155 MOVING FORWARD
